The following tables summarize issues and ideas presented to: the Escambia RESTORE Advisory Committee at their monthly public meetings¹; to the County through information and reference document submissions; and to Dewberry during initial meetings with stakeholders at the launch of this project and subsequent follow-up.

The goal of this exercise is to provide a comprehensive list of issues/challenges facing the County which should be considered for holistic planning purposes. The first three topic categories are based groupings of the eligible criteria under the Direct Component of the RESTORE Act of 2012 (see first table). The final category (social issues) represents issues that may not be eligible for RESTORE funding, but eligible for other sources of federal and state funding. These categories do not reflect future project criteria categories. It is for the initial needs assessment process.
